

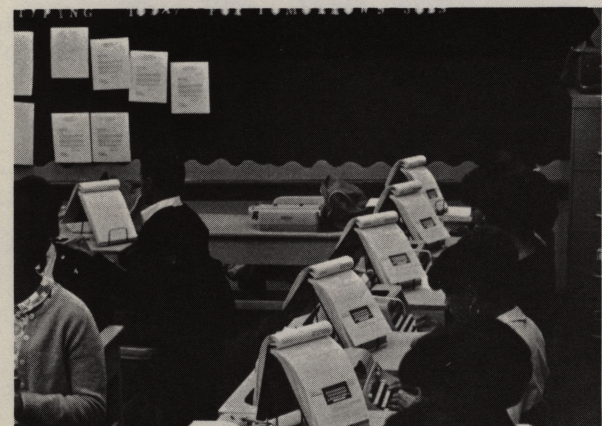
## N. E. C. A. Takes Active

WHAT N. E. C. A. NEEDS  
To Continue Its Operation:

N. E. C. A. is funded under the community action title of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. Funds are supplied by the Government only to supplement local funds.

In order to meet its needs next year to continue operation at the present level, N. E. C. A. will need a total of \$123,410, of which \$24,682, or approximately 20% must come from local sources.

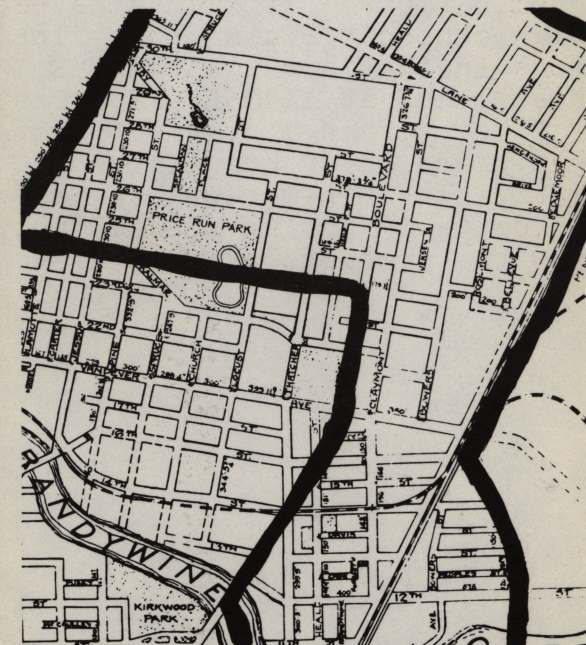

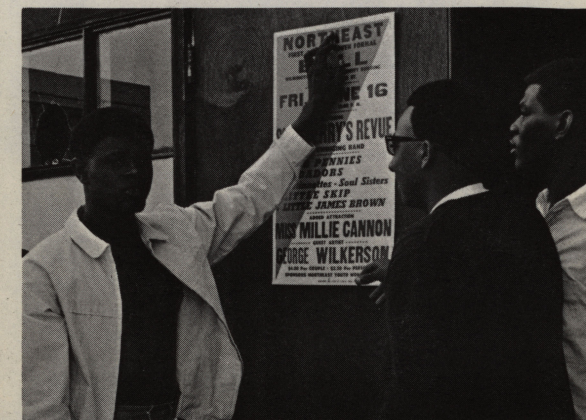

# WHAT IS THE NORTHEAST CONSER- VATION ASSOCIATION?

The Northeast Conservation Association, Inc. (N. E. C. A.) is an organization brought into being by residents of Northeast Wilmington aided by the Price Run Community Council and supported by the co-operative effort of area churches of various denominations. It maintains two neighborhood offices at key locations in that area, at 1015 E. 27 Street, and at 1146 E. 12 Street. N. E. C. A. has a staff of fourteen, made up of neighborhood, youth, and VISTA workers to assist residents in coping productively with the problems of this area.

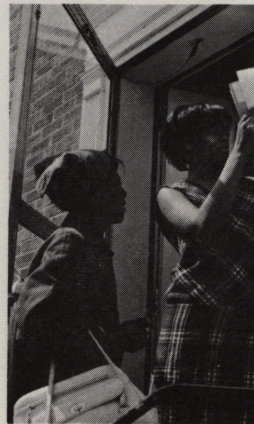
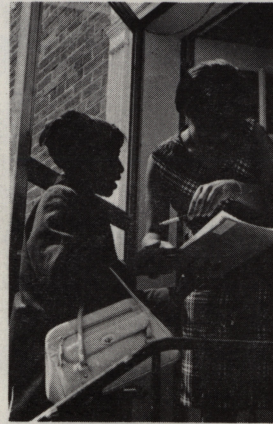
